CCC Review 2022/23

Summary

The focus over the 2022/23 season was to catch up on coaching courses missed during the Covid period, put a system in place where coaches refresh their eLearning on an annual basis and ensure that we have enough support in each age group to maximise the players experience.

As shown by the figures below, this has been successful with all contact coaches now holding a contact qualification, 48 of 52 coaches completing Safeguarding & Headcase eLearning courses, 34 of 37 contact coaches completing the Tackesafe eLearning and a substantial increase in the number of coaches qualified with the Coaching Award, Principles of the Lineout and the initial Tag course. We have also increased the number of parent helpers from 12 last year to 31 by the end of the season.

Courses at the Club

There is a requirement of a minimum of 10 people in order to host a training course at the club. Although we had 10 coaches take the Coaching Award, we were too late to host a course last season but there is one booked for next season starting in October. We did know that we would need a Principles of the Lineout course, as previous ones were cancelled during Covid, and a course was successfully held in March with 11 coaches attending from the club. We also have a Tackle Height Clinic booked in July to go over the new regulations with the majority of the 30 coaches signed up club members.

Going forward, we will look to host Kids First Tag and Kids First Contact alternately at the start of the season with specialist courses arranged when we have the required numbers.

Plan for 2023/24

The plan for next season falls into 3 categories.

1. Academy

With the launch of the Academy, there will be a focus on putting together a club game structure that will start with the Seniors and then be watered down as we go down the age groups. This will aid recognition of calls, game patterns and allow for a more seamless movement from Youth into Colts and onto Seniors. We are also looking to put together coaching guidelines outlining the technical Key Factors for each area of the game so that all coaches are aligned with some becoming more specialist as they move up the age groups. Any new ideas will be discussed amongst the specialist academy coaches leading to a fluid, adaptable system as coaching techniques change.

2. Increased Focus on Younger Age Groups

Now that we have addressed coaching qualifications across the age groups, more time will be available to focus on the newer coaches coming into the youngest age groups or moving into contact for the first time. More help will be given by being available to pass on experience, take sessions where needed and generally mentoring them as they development.

3. Encouraging More Coaches to Qualify

With the number of parent helpers increasing dramatically last year, there will be a focus on encouraging those interested to take the next step and sign up for coaching qualifications so that they can lead sessions as required.
